In recent years, Iraq, India, Somalia, Colombian criminal groups, and terrorists, for example, have all used D&D successfully against the United States. At other times, such as the end of the Cold War, such threats appear to fade into insignificance. The study of the past use of camouflage, concealment, and deception (CCD) in warfare can help current military planners design effective CCD systems. The December 7, 1941 attack on Pearl Harbor has been portrayed by historians as a dazzling success. With most American historians concentrating on command errors and the story of participants’ experiences, the Japanese attack has never been subjected to a comprehensive critical analysis of the military side of the operation. This book presents a detailed evaluation of the attack on the operational and tactical level. It examines such questions as: Was the strategy underlying the attack sound? Were there flaws in planning or execution? How did Japanese military culture influence the planning? How risky was the attack? What did the Japanese expect to achieve, compared to what they did achieve? Were there Japanese blunders? What were their consequences? What might have been the results if the attack had not benefited from the mistakes of the American commanders? The book also addresses the body of folklore about the attack, assessing contentious issues such as the skill level of the Japanese aircrew; whether mini submarines torpedoed Oklahoma and Arizona, as has been recently claimed; whether the Japanese ever really considered launching a third-wave attack—and the consequences for the Naval Shipyard and the fuel storage tanks if it had been executed. In addition, the

analysis has detected for the first time deceptions that a prominent Japanese participant in the attack placed into the historical record, most likely to conceal his blunders and enhance his reputation. The centerpiece of the book is an analysis using modern Operations Research methods and computer simulations, as well as combat models developed between 1922 and 1946 at the US Naval War College. The analysis sheds new light on the strategy and tactics employed by Yamamoto to open the Pacific War, and offers a dramatically different appraisal of the effectiveness of the attack on Pearl Harbor. Planning and executing deliberate deception is critical to an Army unit's success on today's battlefield as well as the battlefield of the future, Informational Warfare makes the concept of obscurity or concealment of tactical operations extremely difficult, if not impossible. Military doctrine, both at the operational and tactical levels, discusses this dilemma, and outlines the necessity for deception in the planning process. Yet, U.S. Army units seem to be lulled into a belief that future adversaries will not possess informational warfare technology, and thus conduct planning as if they are invincible to the detection of opposing forces. Of greater significance is the fact that the typical operations order at tactical level seldom mentions the role or intent of deception as a means to achieve a given endstate. Reasons for failure to consider deception are many, ranging from lack of training about deception to a belief that tactical units do not possess the assets needed to conduct such operations. As a result, deception becomes an after-thought, with commanders placing little emphasis on the planning or execution of such operations. In reality, deception should not be divorced from the base operation, but rather an integral part of the operations order and commander's intent that focuses efforts against that individual (often the OPFOR commander) that is most likely to be influenced by the gamut of deception techniques. Deception provides the enemy a picture of what you want him to see, lulling him into a false sense of security or advantage. This "big lie" may lead the OPFOR to take a desired course of

action, intimidate him in commitment of a chosen action, or contuse him, causing a delay in a decision. Thus, deception should be an integral part of the operations order, driven by commanders in their initial guidance to the staff The deception mission statement. Despite a rich and turbulent history spanning several centuries, malingering continues to be a controversial and neglected clinical condition that has significant implications for medical, social, legal and insurance interests. This monograph examines tactical deception from the US Army corps perspective. Through an examination of the theories of Sun Tzu, Jomini, and Clausewitz, five criteria are distilled that form the framework for the study. The Criteria are centralized planning, enemy commander as deception target, plan aimed at all enemy collection assets, adequate forces allocated, and short duration. The criteria are then examined through historical examples. A study of a corps level deception in British North Africa, 1941 is followed by two American efforts in France in 1944, a Soviet deception in 1943, and the Israeli reaction in the Sinai in 1973. The historical examples flesh out the theoretical criteria which then are applied to the current deception methodology used by the US Army. Finally, future challenges are examined in terms of current capabilities. The monograph concludes that the current deception methodology is not taken seriously by most leaders. Doctrine and leader development admit the need for deception training, but offer few specific guidelines. Training produces few examples of effective

deception. Organization and equipment may be too divided between corps and division to be used effectively; some form of centralized control over all the assets is required.
